Graduation Requirements

To graduate with a Bachelor of Science in Psychology at CSU, students must:

- Complete 120 credits
 - 42 credits must be upper-division (300- or 400-level courses)
 - 30 upper-division credits must be completed at CSU
- Have a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA to remain in good academic standing *and* to graduate
 - A 2.0 minimum cumulative is required for AUCC courses
- Not exceed a *maximum* of 12 credits for any combination of special studies courses, including:
 - Independent Study (PSY 295, PSY 495A-F)
 - Independent Research and/or Thesis (PSY 498A-F, PSY 499A-F)
 - Group Study (PSY 296, PSY 496A-F)
 - Supervised College Teaching (PSY 384, PSY 484)
 - Practicum, Internship, and/or Field Placement (PSY 486, PSY 487, PSY 488)
 - ♦ A maximum of 10 combined credits is allowed for PSY 384 and PSY 484
- Earn a 'C' or better in required Psychology courses at CSU (see page 1 for details)
- Complete CO 150 (AUCC 1A) and MATH (AUCC 1B) by 30 credits (*highly* recommended)

Additional policies:

- Credit will not be granted twice for courses in which a 'D' or higher was earned
- All transfer courses require a minimum grade of 'C-'

Psychology Student Resources

Degree Progress Audit (DARS)

DARS, which is accessed through [RAMweb](#), is the primary tool students should use to check progress toward degree completion and requirements. Students should check DARS at *least* once per semester; ideally, students should check DARS prior to and immediately after any course registration changes. Students should utilize DARS in conjunction with their curriculum checksheet, catalog, and graduation plan.

Academic Advising Expectations & Responsibilities

Academic advising is a relationship with mutual responsibilities between the advisor and student, including sharing accurate and complete information, careful listening, respectful interchange, and timely consultation. The responsibilities for each party are outlined below:

- **Academic Advisors are responsible for** providing information on classes, graduation requirements, curriculum, and other resources to support student success at CSU through advising appointments, drop-in, Canvas, department website, and social media.
- **Students are responsible for** tracking their progress toward graduation by regularly checking DARS, completing their degree, proactively seeking assistance from an advisor after first attempting to obtain information on their own through DARS, Canvas, the catalog, department website, social media, etc., remaining up-to-date with Psychology information, and interacting with faculty.

Academic Advisors serve as a point of contact for students' personal and academic concerns and will connect students with appropriate on-campus resources. Emergencies should be handled by calling 911 or the CSU Police Department (970-491-6425). Academic Advisors are mandated reporters. Information shared with an advisor concerning harm to self and/or others, abuse of children, elders, or at-risk adults, and/or issues of national security will be shared with appropriate authorities.
